## **PURPOSE OF CIRCULAR**

To provide advance notice of regulatory change that will effect the tow truck industry.

January 1, 2007, all tow trucks with a Gross Vehicle Weight Rating (GVWR) of less than 5,500 kgs must comply with Motor Vehicle Act Regulations (MVAR) Division 19.11.

## **BACKGROUND**

Transport Canada enacted Motor Vehicle Safety Regulation 5.2 "Gross Vehicle Weight Rating" in February 1998, which states the Gross Vehicle Weight Rating of a vehicle shall be not less than the sum of the unloaded vehicle mass and the cargo-carrying capacity.

To maintain the national standard, MVAR Division 19.11 specifies that vehicles must not exceed the manufacturers GVWR or Gross Axle Weight Rating (GAWR). This is in compliance with Transport Canada, Motor Vehicle Safety Regulations and equivalent regulations in other jurisdictions across North America.

In February 1997, exemptions to the MVAR, Division 19.11 (4), (5) and the Commercial Transport Act Regulations (CTAR), Division 7.32 (7), (8) were implemented to allow a grace period for the tow truck industry operating with tow trucks with a GVWR of less than 5,500 kgs.

It is important the industry members are aware of the expiry date of the exemption, **January 1**, **2007.** This date should also be considered in future vehicle acquisitions and replacement decisions.
